VOICING VISUAL ART

Planning & Proposal

When selecting a work of visual art, consider your own interests as well as what has been most interesting to you about our inclass discussions of visual art that you might want to explore further. Complete the proposal form in consultation with Dr. Sturm with a clear sense of the purpose of the assignment, which will engage with all five modes of WOVEN.

Process

You should document your entire process, including annotated primary and secondary sources, your own notes, and peer-review notes. The peer review session on 10/19 will focus on revising your draft script and will be crucial to your success on this artifact. Consider tone, pacing, range of rhetorical gestures, use of secondary sources to establish expertise, and how effectively the segment meets the project description. Remember to record in a quiet space and to familiarize yourself with Audacity or comparable recording software to edit your recording.

Project Description

Individually, each student will create a well-designed, informative website that hosts a podcast-like audio segment describing a work of avant-garde visual art. This podcast will investigate the aesthetic, cultural, political, and/or historical importance of the piece of visual art. The artifact will 1) offer a persuasive and indepth multimodal view into the piece of art that shows your ability to develop and implement an aesthetic vocabulary and, 2) create an informative and creative electronic environment that hosts your recording. The primary challenge of this artifact is the process of describing a work of visual art in an oral medium. The final podcast will be at least 5 minutes long but no longer than 7 minutes. Consider "The Lonely Palette" podcast as a guiding example of how to approach planning the recording and structuring your script.

Reviews, criticism, and scholarship is available on all of these artists and their work—sometimes there will be seemingly too much information, as with Jean-Michel Basquiat, and sometimes there will be much less or it be more recent, as with George Schneeman. If you have an idea about an artist not listed here whose work you'd like to explore, talk with Dr. Sturm.

You are required to utilize two reputable secondary sources in your research, such as an interview with your artist, a scholarly article about your artist, or a review of a show by your artist. Use GSU Library resources like Academic Search Complete and JSTOR to search for secondary sources.

Recording and submitting Artifact #2

- If you have access to a snowball microphone or have the opportunity to rent one from the CATLab in Aderhold, this type of microphone will give your recording a professional, crisp sound. It is also okay to record on your smartphone. Your least desirable option is to record directly to your computer. If you record on your phone or computer, work to control your recording environment by recording in a small space, hanging blankets around you to dampen any outside sounds, and doing a short test recording to be sure your volume levels are clear and consistent.
- Use a straight forward editing program like Audacity or GarageBand to lightly edit your recording. Your goal is not to match the editing of "The Lonely Palette," but to experiment with intro and outro music/sound, organizing your recording into legible segments, and editing out "um's," "ah's," or any other sonic inconsistencies.
- Upload your podcast to SoundCloud and embed your podcast directly into your website.
- **Submission (3 items required)**: Upload the SoundCloud link, the text of your script, and the Works Cited to Canvas under Artifact #2. Due Friday October 29 @ 11:59pm.
